Action	When?	What Was It?	Why Was It Enacted?	Colonial Reaction?
Navigation Acts	1651-1673	A series of laws designed to CONTROL colonial trading practices	To make sure that the colonial trading practices DID NOT hurt / interfere with the British economy. The colonies should NOT be <u>COMPETING WITH</u> British manufacturers	
Proclamation of 1763	1763	A law that kept American colonists from settling WEST of the Appalachian Mountains	Designed to prevent further conflicts between Native Americans & colonial expansion. Parliament did not believe that the British military could not adequately protect the colonists in this region	
Sugar Act (INDIRECT TAX)	1764	A law that placed TAXES / DUTIES on sugar, molasses, & other products imported to the colonies. Also established first Vice-Admiralty court	Created to stop the smuggling of molasses First law passed for the purpose of raising revenue in the colonies for the Crown (pay off F & I war debts)	

Action	When?	What Was It?	Why Was It Enacted?	Colonial Reaction?
Quartering Act	1765	Colonists had to board (food & housing) British soldiers when possible	To help support British military To help cut some of the expenses of having a military presence in the colonies	
Stamp Act (FIRST DIRECT TAX in the colonies)	1765	Tax placed on all PRINTED materials in the colonies (contracts, newspapers, playing cards, etc..) Offenders were tried in Vice-Admiralty courts	To help pay the costs of the growing military presence in the American colonies REPEALED IN 1766	
Declaratory Act	1766	Passed by Parliament to show that Britain had the power & right to pass laws & enact taxes on the American colonies	Passed along with the repeal of the Stamp Act to show the colonists that Britain still ruled over them <i>(Most colonists did not even realize that the Dec. Act had been passed – too busy celebrating the Stamp Act's repeal)</i>
